

On Tuesday, 28 January, the Grade 10 Life Sciences learners conducted two exciting experiments.

In these experiments, we identified which foods contain monosaccharides and polysaccharides. We were given a variety of foods to test whether they contained either starch/cellulose (polysaccharides) by using iodine solution, or whether they were monosaccharides by identifying a change in the colour of Fehling's A and B solution if glucose was present.

After conducting our first proper experiments in Life Sciences, we are definitely looking forward to learning more!
