On 5 February 2025, Rhenish held its first blood drive for the year. The Western Province Blood Service team arrived around 10 and began their setup in the Rhenish Hall. By the time the first break rolled around, every chair could be seen occupied by learners, as well as staff, donating blood while others sat filling in forms and waiting for their turn.

Although donating blood can often be a daunting experience, many Rhenish girls expressed immense excitement at the prospect of being able to make a difference in someone's life. This is a true example of the heart and spirit of Rhenish girls who, at the end of the day, had donated a total of 40 full units of blood. This vastly exceeded the donation team's goal of 25 units for the day.

Overall, this blood drive was a great success, and we are extremely grateful to the amazing team of nurses who not only took the time to make sure our learners felt at ease but also provided insightful information about the donation process and explained just how valuable each of our girls' contributions were.
