LC CAMP 2024 -Developing our leaders

Last weekend, the newly elected learner council was fortunate enough to participate in a leadership camp at Back 2 Basics in Grabouw. The beginning of the camp included an extremely useful and interesting leadership workshop at Rhenish with Ms Conchar. This workshop allowed us to break the ice and learn about the importance of leadership and ourselves, which made the workshop captivating and enjoyable. After our workshop at school, we were fortunate enough to enjoy lunch as a group at the Rhenish Hostel. After much anticipation and excitement, we left Rhenish and headed for The Back 2 Basics campsite.

We were greeted by extremely friendly staff who would later become our leaders and guides throughout our stay at the camp. After being split into two large army style tents, we began with the activities. Over the course of 2 days, we participated in activities that brought us together as a group and allowed us to learn the importance of working together and asking for help when needed. On the first night, we participated in a night walk and were asked to go one by one through a path in the forest with no light or knowledge of the route. Our only guidance was to hold onto a string called the 'lifeline', which would lead us to the end of the path. This taught us the importance of finding a lifeline and holding onto it through difficult situations, which will always lead you to the end. One of the last activities we did, a highlight for most of the learner council, was a muddy obstacle course. Although challenging, this obstacle course was extremely enjoyable, and we got to learn how an obstacle course can be compared to our own lives.

Throughout the camp, the liaisons of the learner council conducted multiple sessions with us, during which we learned essential leadership skills and decided on missions we planned to execute as an LC throughout our term of office. We also go to present collages we had made beforehand, designed to learn some interesting and amusing facts about each other to get to know each other better. In our free time at the camp, we often played games and learned more about each other as a group, which allowed us to bond almost instantly as a learner council.

By the end of the camp, we connected on a deeper level. We supported each other in our final activities and initiatives throughout the sessions.

This camp taught us the importance of working as a unit within the Learner Council and how to be mindful of one another. We united as a group at a pace that no one had expected going into this camp, but it was great to see how close we became over such a short period, and this makes me hopeful that the future of this Learner Council is bright and promising.

Over the last couple of weekends in August we argued A LOT. By this, I mean that the Rhenish debaters competed in the annual Western Cape Schools Debating Competition over two recent weekends.

Over the first weekend, we debated at Rondebosch Boys' High School; nerves ran high as we debated our first round of motions. The topics ranged from ethics and morals to political tactics and government policy. Both teams excelled and secured multiple wins.

The second weekend of Provincials was held at UCT and we were heading in ready to secure our next few wins. We debated various topics and a prepped motion regarding crime and government duty. All teams participated on Saturday, and the teams that 'broke' were announced at the end of the day. , This was the top 8 teams for the juniors and the top 16 teams for the seniors. The juniors broke in 8th position and the seniors in 14th. The teams that broke then competed on Sunday, all vying for first place.

The juniors had a tough day ahead as, in the quarterfinals, they went head to head with the team ranked in first place; they fought and emerged with a win, pushing them through to the semi-finals where they secured another win against Edgemead. In the finals, competing for first or second place against Paarl Girls' High School, a nail-biting debate took place, with both teams debating at an extremely high and competitive level. The junior team ended up ranking second in the Western Cape, an achievement we are extremely proud of.

The seniors started the Finals day on a high; they successfully competed and made it to the Plate finals, where they debated the motion 'THP (This House Prefers) to live in a world where happiness is predominantly seen as a consequence of random factors rather than a personal choice'. In a tough debate, the seniors unanimously took first place in the Plate draw - meaning they came 9th in the province.

Throughout this tournament, not only have we grown as individual speakers, by taking all the feedback given to us after every debate and applying this to our speeches and strategy heading into the debates that followed. We also grew as teams, the highs and lows of winning and losing tested our bonds as teammates as well as learning how to communicate effectively and efficiently in a high-stress environment. Ultimately this all led to the growth of both teams and we believe this is one of the reasons we were able to do so well in the tournament. We further got taught a hard lesson in perseverance and persistence, winning was a great feeling, but we had to learn that the losses were not something we should be hung up on, and we had to go into the next debate with a clear and focused mind.

Over the two weekends, we were not competing against the other teams to try to win Provincials, but we were also competing to be selected for the Western Cape Debating team. One of our speakers, Sara Rawoot, was selected for the senior team.

I also want to say thank you to Ms Shaw, on behalf of all the debaters. Thank you for taking the time to support us at Provincials and for putting up with all of our arguing, thank you for all the time you gave up to be there with us, we appreciate you.

I think all the debaters are ready and raring for Provincials 2025!
